- Work with local leaders to identify priority issues for the county
- Citizens Jury events bring together a microcosm of the community
  - Quality information from local speakers
  - Time to deliberate and identify challenges and opportunities
  - Prioritizes community needs and responses
- Create community-based responses to climate and energy challenges

Redwood County Energy Dialogues

- September 12-14, 2019
- 18 demographically representative participants
- Heard from speakers on:
  - Overview of the energy development process
  - Redwood County finances and decision-making
  - Design guidelines and developer considerations
  - Impacts of wind on agriculture and rural economies

## Top Benefits

- 1. Annual production tax that goes to the local government
- 2. Financial gains to the community, landowners, and the possibility that it could reduce taxes
- 3. Money is spent locally which helps create an overall better life for residents, both economically and environmentally
- 4. Wind development creates a different and sustainable source of revenue for local government
- 5. Wind development creates a steady source of income from the production tax to put toward community projects

# Top Drawbacks

- 1. There may be no opportunity for local utilities to use the power generated by the turbines
- 2. Funding may not be distributed between the County and townships evenly
- 3. The high cost to increase capacity in the transmission grid
- 4. Wind development can create obstacles to farmers to be productive, and possible destruction of equipment and repair costs
- 5. Potential damage to habitat and environment

Based on what you've learned, do you feel residents should support expanded/future wind development in Redwood County?

- Yes, under most circumstances / whenever possible
  - 56% (10 votes)
- Yes, but only if certain conditions are met / put in place
  - 44% (8 votes)
- No, not under any circumstances
  - 0% (0 votes)
